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Springtime of the Liturgical Year

Lent – the springtime of the Liturgical Year – is a season of preparing for the Sacred Triduum: Holy Thursday, Good Friday and Easter. With the catechumens and candidates for full communion in the Church, we enter this season of prayer, fasting and almsgiving as we look forward to renewing our Baptismal promises on Easter. This season culminates with the solemn Easter Vigil on Holy Saturday evening April 7, at 8:30 PM. I invite you to join me in considering ways we can grow during Lent this year.

Prayer: Take time each day to listen attentively to the Word of God in the Bible and other teachings of the Church. The daily readings listed in the weekly parish bulletin may be helpful.

Fasting: Join the universal Church (if over 14 years old) in abstaining from meat on Ash Wednesday and every Friday during Lent and fasting (21 to 59 years old – one full meal and two lesser meals with no snacking between meals) on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday.

Almsgiving: Giving up something we don't need to buy and donating the money saved to the Rice Bowl, poor box or some other charity.

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LENT: A Time to Grow in Holiness



Memories *by Mike Dury*

My first memory of attending Mass at Holy Cross can be dated back to when I was a ripe young age of six years old. I remember my dad telling me on a Saturday that I was going to be serving the 9:00 AM Mass the following day. I did not want to do it at first. After all, I had never been an altar boy, never considered doing it, and was not sure exactly what was expected of me. But, dad insisted, so I went along with it. (As if a six-year-old had a choice.)

sacristy and immediately put me at ease. He joked, he laughed, and was smiling the whole time. I remember distinctly one of his jokes he told that gave me a chuckle. The altar boy garment I wore had a hood in the back. Apparently, it was all over the place before Mass because Father straightened it out for me, convincing me in my naivete that members of the congregation would put dollar bills in it to reward me for my good work. To my disappointment, this never happened, but no longer was I worried about fouling up during the Mass.

(Which I did not understand at the time.) After receiving our Lord and concluding the Mass, we all gathered in front of the altar for a picture with Father.

We arrived the next morning around 8:30. It was always 8:30 because dad led the rosary before Holy Mass. I went back into the sacristy still not real sure what I was doing. Fr. Berendt was hearing confessions that morning, and he usually finished around a quarter til nine. That day was no exception. Father walked back into the

Soon after that, I and a few others in my class received our first confession and Holy Communion from Fr. Berendt – a very special day to say the least. During these Masses, Father would always come down during the homily to speak with the kids who would be receiving our Lord for the first time. It was somewhat like Q and

These memories I will never forget and what makes Holy Cross so special. This holy place of our Lord has been in Columbus for almost 175 years. If one were to pause and ponder that fact, one could only conclude that this church has been blessed and protected by our Lord. There is a fundamental reason for this that I believe cannot be overlooked. Holy Cross and the people within this church can have an impact on people’s lives. I know it has on mine. During these coming days, we should determine what this Lent means to each of us and how we can live these days to our greatest spiritual advantage. This indeed is a time of anticipation and preparation, but also a time of awareness.
