THE WORD

Today’s first reading from the book of Sirach sets the stage for the parable of Jesus to follow. “The prayer of the lowly pierces the clouds” (Sirach 35:17). Today’s Gospel is a perfect example of how the prayer of the humble effects justification. “In a sense this passage joins those of chapter 15 as one of the great Lucan parables of mercy – about God’s mercy shown to a sinner who stands before Him and acknowledges his own worthlessness” (Joseph A. Fitzmyer, “The Gospel According to Luke,” *Anchor Bible*, vol. 28 A, p.1184).

Earlier in the Gospel Jesus declared, “I have not come to call the righteous to repentance but sinners” (Luke 5:32). The Pharisee and the tax collector are types of the self-righteous and the sinner. Clearly, not all Pharisees are self-righteous, but as a group they have become the model of that attitude. The man in the parable lists his virtues, justifying himself before God. For example, he goes farther than the Mosaic law demands in fasting and tithing. But he has disdain for the tax collector and “the rest of humanity – greedy, dishonest, adulterous” (18:11).

By contrast, the tax collector also appears before God in the temple with all the signs of true repentance. He “would not even raise his eyes to heaven but beat his breast and prayed, ‘O God, be merciful to me a sinner’” (18:13). He leaves judgment to God. Jesus, as the Son of God, declares the tax collector justified.

Luke wants his Christian readers to learn the lesson from the parable. Humility is required, not self-exaltation. All followers of Jesus should approach Him with the tax collector’s humble and contrite prayer of petition, “O God, be merciful to me a sinner” (18:13). The book of Sirach can also provide a final insight into today’s teaching: “Nor will it [the prayer of the lowly] withdraw till the Most High responds, judges justly and affirms the right” (Sirach 35:18), exactly as Jesus did in today’s parable.
